

How to Make and Use

Fold the outer edges of a file folder to the center to create four sections, then unfold.

The pieces to create each lapbook are found on three pages. The first page has the letters to trace as well as the sticks for letter sorting. This page can be printed on paper and laminated, or printed on cardstock, or simply printed on paper. The first option is the most durable and creates a wipeable surface that children can trace on using dry erase markers. The second option is simply more sturdy. The third option is the least durable. If you wish to make the tracing activity into a tactile experience where the child traces a rough surface with his finger instead of a marker, then you can mix colored sand with glue and paint it on the letter allowing several hours for it to dry. See the diagram below for the location of each piece.

The second page has the Let's Learn About square, the letter find activity, and a train car with the uppercase and lowercase letters. All can be printed on plain paper. The Let's Learn About square placed as shown below. The train car can be glued to the outside of the lapbook as a label. The letter find can be laminated if you wish to have the child mark the letters with dry erase marker. Otherwise, the child can mark them with crayons or place an object such as a pompom or glass gem on each correct letter.

The third page has the letter sort pockets and a letter train. It can be printed on paper. Fold the tabs behind each pocket and glue onto file folder. Accordion fold the letter train on the dotted lines and glue the large section onto the file folder.
